Partnership Pastoral Council

The Partnership Pastoral Council for the Clontarf and Killester Parishes is now up and running! It is part of the Building Hope project launched by Archbishop Dermot. An extract from the book Francis & Clare, A true story by John M Sweeney: Renewing the Bonds of Creation

There was a sense in which the words of prayer, piety, and preaching were seen to partake sacramentally of the Word itself, and creativity entered into one's experience of God. In song and poetry sung in the vernacular, they made spirituality seem possible to those who were untrained in formal religion. Spirituality at home began to be possible.

The distinctions between a theologically literate clergy class and an obedient, pious laity class began to break down. Franciscans led the way, through the creation of what was called the "Third Order" of Franciscans (in 1221), in finding ways for laypeople to live vowed lives of spiritual significance, but without leaving behind the world of family, jobs, or other responsibilities. It was also at this time that letter writing became an important vehicle for spiritual encouragement, personal Bible reading and study grew, and discussion of theological issues in the workplace originated. In the decades and centuries immediately after Francis and Clare, home altars became common in Italy. These were places set aside in the home, still common in some Catholic homes today, where a person would replicate the setting of a church for purposes of personal prayer, adding images, icons, rosary beads, and mementos of various kinds. Before Francis and Clare, we have little evidence of this. Similarly vernacular spiritual writing was almost nonexistent before Francis and Clare. But in the century after their deaths, the lives of Francis penned by Thomas of Celano were among the most popular choices for daily reading, and the vernacular Italian works of spirituality became almost too many to count.

The connection between Francis of Assisi and animals is the single fact about him that most people know. We have tales of his encounters with animals, fish, invertebrates, and plants. In all of these ways, Franciscans emphasized that creation includes more than humankind. Just as they redefined what it means to be family, they further widened the fraternity to link human's and creatures in the same relationship with God.
